
This mini-crag has been climbed on for many years but individual routes were never recorded until now, this guide has been put together from information provided by F & M Scrowston and PC Bennett.

Situated in an idyllic position overlooking Blea Tarn and with expansive views to the Langdale Pikes this is a sunny crag of immaculate rock. There is a nice flat area below the crag, ideal for a family picnic. The left side of the crag is slabby and can be climbed almost anywhere at no more than **4c** and the described routes are closely spaced and would be good for children to top rope. The right side is steeper and offers a couple of much tougher options. A feature of the climbing here is the lack of regular and reliable protection, this isn't a place to push your grade! There is an abseil chain at the top of the left hand buttress, this removes the need to plough through heather and juniper bushes to regain the bottom of the slab.

Approach

Park at the Blea Tarn N.T. car park. Cross the cattle grid and small beck then strike uphill on a steep path; after 200m a sheep trod is followed rightwards to arrive at the hidden crag 5 min from the road.


